oastal Carolina University traditionally embraces a teacherscholar model, with an emphasis on high-quality teaching and engaged learning. A significant increase in student population has initiated a need for support classroom and office space in the humanities and business departments of the university.

The building, intersecting major pedestrian pathways, serves as a gateway, pass-through structure for inner-campus connectivity. The building was constructed

consistent with the traditional architectural style of the campus and meeting a minimum LEED Silver certification. The interiors are of high quality to model the university's expression of excellence, while maintaining an inviting environment enhancing the learning experience and student/ faculty interaction.

Housed within the building are 103 administrative offices for general faculty and department chairpersons, along with conference rooms and support spaces. Educational spaces include general multiuse

classroom spaces for varying occupants to serve primarily humanities, math, English, and history departments, consisting of six 25-seat classrooms, six 30-seat classrooms, one 85-seat lecture hall, and two 125-seat lecture halls.

Technological advances were incorporated into thoughtfully designed classroom spaces to optimize student/teacher engagement. Support services include a moderate bagel shop, which has become a major gathering spot on campus ■
